


Eric & Kate Morrisett - District 3 Volunteers and Montana Volunteers of the Year

Members must be 10 by October 1, 2025 to enroll in a cattle project.

Beef Weigh-Ins

The minimum weight for 2026 Marias Fair is 1,100 pounds; max pay weight is 1,650 pounds, select steers accordingly. Each exhibitor may weigh in one spare animal/species. Any breeding animals must have the 4-H Clover tattoo OR Association registration tattoo OR Bangs vaccination tattoo by the official hog weigh-in deadline (which will be in April 2026).

All steers must be dehorned, fully castrated, and born after January 1, 2025. Information to bring to weigh-in: Steer's birth date, Breed of steer (including percentages of each breed), Breeder's name and mailing address, and Bill of Sale. 4-Hers are also encouraged to have a Show Cattle Permit as well for transportation purposes. If you have any questions on what is needed or need to get a Brand Inspection, please call Jeff Jergens, district brand inspector, at 406-450-0001 or Tom Seifert at 406-873-5700.

4-H Enrollment Continues

- Please enroll by December 1 to have your club pay your dues. After that, families will be responsible for their own dues.

- Record books Please be sure to get forms picked up for the new year, each members needs a My 4-H Year and animals journals for all animal projects (livestock, small animals, etc.) and non-animal project journals for any non-animal projects (cooking, sewing, shooting sports, etc.). Please see https://www.montana.edu/extension/glacier/4H.html for record book resources and/or the sample record book in the Extension Office.
- Drop/Add deadline Members have until May 1 to drop or add projects.

Project Age Requirements

- Youth must meet the minimum required age by October 1, 2025 in order to enroll in each project.
- Cloverbuds 5 years old, Regular 4-H 8 years old
- Shooting Sports 9 years old
- Market Beef & Beef Breeding 10 years old
- Teen Leadership 13 years old Ambassador 14 years old
- Colt to Maturity 11 years old and have completed Horsemanship Levels 1, 2, and 3

4-H Fair Designation

4-H members enrolled in Blackfeet 4-H or Glacier, Liberty, Pondera or Toole County 4-H programs may only exhibit at one local fair, either Charging Home Stampede or Marias Fair. 4-H members must tell their local Extension office by December 1 of the current 4H year which fair they will participate in if it is not their local 4-H fair. Blackfeet 4-H Fair is Charging Home Stampede & Glacier/Liberty/Pondera/Toole Fair is Marias Fair.

Shooting Sports

Archery, Air Rifle and Air Pistol will be starting in December with weekly practices, watch for an email on practice times. If any adults are interested in volunteering, please contact Kari Lewis. Upcoming shorting sports trainings include December 12 - 13 in Kalispell, January 9 - 10 in Fort Benton. To be certified as a shooting sports leader, leader must be at least 21 years of age, enrolled as a leader and pass a background check, complete the 4-H training and shooting sports modules, and attend a training (good for 7 years).


Butter Braid Fund-Raiser Success! Clubs raise just under \$4,000
